LOG CABIN REPUBLICANS IN OHIO

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In the 2004 general election, Ohio was one of several states in which a constitutional amendment prohibiting gay marriage appeared on the ballot. This is widely believed to have resulted in an unprecedented turnout among rural white evangelical Christians, which helped George W. Bush win the presidential election. In Ohio, the proposition was known as "Issue One."

To investigate the matter, I prepared a table comparing the vote for president with the vote on Issue One, county by county. State wide, Issue One received 61.71% of the vote, whereas Bush, officially, is reputed to have received 50.81% of the vote, a differential of 10.90%. Bush ran 469,567 votes (14.10%) behind the "Yes" votes on Issue One, and Kerry ran 675,705 votes (32.71%) ahead of the "No" votes on Issue One.

However, when I looked at the county totals, I discovered that there were eleven counties in which Bush actually received more votes than Issue One. In three of these counties (Clermont, Delaware and Warren), more people actually voted against Issue One than are reported to have voted for Kerry. That is to say, some people must have voted for gay marriage <a href="mailto:and-order-and-or-ed-and-or-

These counties had come to my attention before. Together with Butler County, they provided Bush with his largest margins of victory in Ohio and, with it, the presidency.

Bush outpolled Issue One in Butler County as well. The proposition carried by 109,779 votes to 51,462.

To investigate the matter further, I prepared tables comparing the vote totals for President and for Issue One, for every city, village and township in each of the four counties. Those in which Bush ran far ahead of the "Yes" vote on Issue One, and Kerry ran far behind the "No" vote on Issue One, were singled out for closer examination at the precinct level. To calculate the number of gay marriage supporters who must have voted for Bush, I subtracted the "No" votes on Issue One from Kerry's total in each precinct where the result was negative. This is an extremely conservative assumption, because it assumes that Bush received the votes of all voters who supported Issue One, and of all who did not vote on Issue One. For each of these who voted for Kerry, and there must have been some, there would have to be yet another gay marriage supporter who voted for Bush.

DELAWARE COUNTY

Delaware County, located just north of Columbus, is the fastest-growing county in Ohio. Its population according to the 2000 census was 109,989. By 2003 its population had grown to 132,797, an increase of 20.74%. Voter registration increased from 80,132 in 2000 to 100,676 in 2004, an increase of 25.64%. Voter turnout increased from 55,959 in 2000 to 81,175 in 2004, an increase of 45.06%, the largest of any county in Ohio. Voter turnout as a percentage of registered voters was reportedly 80.63% county wide, the highest of any county in the state. Turnout reached as high as 91.18% in Powell City, Precinct G, and 91.01% in Concord Township, Precinct C.

In Delaware County, there were 24,942 more votes counted for president in 2004 than in 2000. In order for Bush to have made the gains awarded to him in the official results, he must have gotten the votes of at least 16,239 (65.11%) of 19,202 new voters, or the equivalent, assuming with good reason that the Green voters did not support Bush.

Because the township totals provided by the Board of Elections sometimes include cities listed separately in the precinct totals, it was not possible to avoid duplication of some vote totals. This made it impossible to compile an accurate table listing the vote totals for each city and township in the county, so I have not reproduced it here. My attempt to do so did reveal seven cities and townships worth examining at the precinct level:

For each of the seven cities and townships, each precinct is listed below. Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in each of 59 precincts in these cities and townships. Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in all but one precinct, and he ran even in that one.

In Dublin City, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for at least 373 of 2853 ballots cast (13.1%), ranging as high as 90 of 612 (14.7%) in Precinct 3B. City wide, Issue One got 61.5% of the vote, while Bush got 75.6% of the vote.

In Powell City, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for at least 438 of 5,065 ballots cast (8.6%), ranging as high as 65 of 560 (11.6%) in Precinct A. City wide, Issue One got 59.9% of the vote, while Bush got 69.6% of the vote.

In Westerville City, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for at least 249 of 4199 ballots cast (5.9%), ranging as high as 58 of 553 (10.5%) in Precinct B. City wide, Issue One got 60.0% of the vote, while Bush got 66.6% of the vote.

In Concord Township, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for at least 279 of 4221 ballots cast (6.6%), ranging as high as 68 of 788 (8.6%) in Precinct B. In the entire township, Issue One got 62.4% of the vote, while Bush got 69.9% of the vote.

In Genoa Township, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for at least 502 of 11,440 ballots cast (4.4%), ranging as high as 94 of 1136 (8.3%) in Precinct I. In the entire township, Issue One got 64.0% of the vote, while Bush got 69.7% of the vote.

In Liberty Township, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for at least 558 of 7,397 ballots cast (7.5%), ranging as high as 95 of 743 (12.8%) in Precinct H. In the entire township, Issue One got 62.3% of the vote, while Bush got 71.1% of the vote.

In Orange Township, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for at least 465 of 9,617 ballots cast (4.8%), ranging as high as 90 of 1,015 (8.9%) in Precinct I. In the entire township, Issue One got 61.7% of the vote, while Bush got 67.8% of the vote.

CLERMONT COUNTY

Clermont County was one of three large counties in southwestern Ohio (the others being Warren and Butler counties) that provided Bush with his entire margin of victory in Ohio. According to the official results, Bush carried these three counties by 132,685 votes, while his plurality statewide was only 118,775 votes. In all three of these counties, Bush actually increased his percentage of the vote compared to the 2000 election, while Kerry received a smaller percentage than Gore in 2000, despite the absence of Ralph Nader from the ballot. In all three counties, the number of ballots cast was up sharply compared to 2000, despite comparatively small population increases. A full analysis is contained in my previous paper, "Election Results in Southwestern Ohio," submitted to the Ohio Supreme Court.

In Clermont County, there were 19,202 more votes counted for president in 2004 than in 2000. In order for Bush to have made the gains awarded to him in the official results, he must have gotten the votes of at least 15,541 (80.93%) of 19,202 new voters, or the equivalent, assuming with good reason that the Green voters did not support Bush.

The Clermont County results have been officially challenged based upon observations made during the "recount." There are sworn affidavits from recount observers for the Democratic, Green, and Libertarian parties that optical scan ballots were altered, either on Election Night or in preparation for the "recount." Optical scan ballots have ovals next to candidates' names that need to be filled in with a pencil so that the optical scanner can "read" the ballot. Observers saw white stickers over the marks for Kerry-Edwards, and the Bush ovals were colored in, so the optical scanner would count the votes for Bush. We need to examine all ballots for Clermont County to determine how many ballots cast for Kerry were altered to become ballots counted for Bush. There will be DNA on the stickers, and if the ballot was not an "overvote" to begin with there will be different graphite on the Bush ovals than on the rest of the ballot. We also need DNA samples of all persons who had access to the ballots.

In Clermont County there are several cities and towns where Bush received far more votes than Issue One. By far the largest of these are Miami Township and Union Township. Because the precinct canvass records are available online only in Adobe format, I am unable to rearrange the data without retyping it myself. Therefore I have prepared tables showing only the precincts with the greatest variance from the state wide pattern.

In Miami Township, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in all 38 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in 33 of 38 precincts. In the seven precincts shown above, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for 600 of 7,122 ballots cast (8.4%), ranging as high as 101 of 868 (11.6%) in Precinct Y, and 122 of 940 (13.0%) in Precinct Z. In the entire township, out of 21,457 ballots cast, at least 1,172 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 67.2% of the vote, while Bush got 73.7% of the vote.

In Union Township, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in all 40 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in 27 of 40 precincts. In the five precincts shown above, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for 329 of 4,452 ballots cast (7.4%), ranging as high as 76 of 745 (10.2%) in Precinct B1B. In the entire township, out of 20,965 ballots cast, at least 609 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 66.0% of the vote, while Bush got 70.3% of the vote.

WARREN COUNTY

Warren County, a Republican stronghold northeast of Cincinnati, came to national attention on election night. While the nation awaited returns from Ohio, the state that would decide the election, county officials locked down the administrative building and prohibited all independent observers from watching the vote count. According to the Cincinnati Enquirer, "County officials initially said they feared that having reporters and photographers present could interfere with the ballot counting. They subsequently cited homeland security concerns. ... Besides locking the doors, the county had two pickup trucks out front, police in the building, and a bomb-sniffing dog." However, both state and federal homeland security officials have said they were unaware of any terrorist threat to Warren County. All of this only served to focus public attention on Warren County, and people began to question the vote count.

In Warren County, there were 25,202 more votes counted for president in 2004 than in 2000. In order for Bush to have made the gains awarded to him in the official results, he must have gotten the votes of at least 19,364 (76.84%) of 25,202 new voters, or the equivalent, assuming with good reason that the Green voters did not support Bush.

In Warren County, six cities and townships stand out as highly suspect: Clear Creek Township, Deerfield Township, Hamilton Township, Lebanon City, Mason City, and Springboro City. These are the same six jurisdictions which I singled out in my previous paper, entitled "Election Results in Southwestern Ohio," submitted to the Ohio Supreme Court. I noted that Bush's inflated margin of victory in Warren County came primarily from these six cities and townships (Bush won a plurality of 28,869 votes in 2004, compared to 19,822 votes in 2000), and that all of them reported extraordinary increases in voter registration (from 59,336 in 2000 to 81,355 in 2004, an increase of 37.1%).

In each of these six jurisdictions, Bush ran well <u>ahead</u> of the "Yes" votes on Issue One, and Kerry ran far <u>behind</u> the "No" votes on Issue One, which is the exact opposite of the state wide trend exemplified, even in Warren County, in Carlisle City, Franklin City, and Franklin Township. I have prepared tables showing every precinct in the six suspect cities and townships of Warren County, by rearranging the data file posted on the Board of Elections website at http://www.co.warren.oh.us/bdelec/ This was a tedious procedure, as the precinct names are all in code, and the precincts are scattered about the canvass records at random rather than being arranged in lists for each jurisdiction. I know of no other Board of Elections in Ohio that reports its election results in such a manner.

In Lebanon City, the presidential vote closely resembled the vote on Issue One in 7 of 14 precincts, where only 17 gay marriage supporters are needed in order to explain the vote totals for Bush. And yet, in other precincts in the same city, gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for 49 of 593 ballots cast (8.3%) in Precinct LEB C M AAL, 58 of 661 (8.8%) in LEB C SEB AFY, and 79 of 845 (9.4%) in LEB C SW AAT. City wide, out of 8,372 ballots cast, at least 232 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 69.3% of the vote, while Bush got 72.3% of the vote.

In Springboro City, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in 12 of 15 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in 11 of 15 precincts. Gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for 67 of 831 ballots cast (8.1%) in Precinct SPG C SE AFB, 62 of 667 (9.3%) in SPG C EM AEV, 65 of 696 (9.3%) in SPG NEA AFN, and 65 of 683 (9.5%) in SPG C NE AEX. City wide, out of 8,250 ballots cast, at least 441 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 67.2% of the vote, while Bush got 73.2% of the vote.

In Mason City, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in all 23 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in all but one precinct. The most egregious example is Precinct MAS C NEA AAY where, out of 623 ballots cast, 76 (12.2%) were gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush. Issue One got 63.7% of the vote, while Bush got 76.7% of the vote, excluding third parties. City wide, out of 14,893 ballots cast, at least 672 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 68.6% of the vote, while Bush got 74.1% of the vote.

In Clear Creek Township, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in 8 of 9 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in the same 8 precincts. Gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for 68 of 579 ballots cast (11.7%) in Precinct CLC T WA ABP, and 93 of 839 (11.1%) in CLC T NM ABM. In the entire township, out of 6,650 ballots cast, at least 313 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 71.0% of the vote, while Bush got 76.0% of the vote.

In Deerfield Township, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in all 25 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in all but one precinct. Gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush included 57 of 682 ballots cast (8.4%) in Precinct DEF T SEC ABZ, 54 of 630 (8.6%) in DEF T M ABU, and 68 of 790 (8.6%) in DEF T SWC ACG. In the entire township, out of 16,047 ballots cast, at least 818 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 65.3% of the vote, while Bush got 71.4% of the vote.

In Hamilton Township, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in all 10 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in all but one precinct. Gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for 82 of 836 ballots cast (9.8%) in Precinct HAM T WB ADK, 70 of 869 (8.1%) in HAM T S ADI, and 82 of 1058 (7.8%) in HAM T WA ADJ. In the entire township, out of 8,447 ballots cast, at least 428 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 68.9% of the vote, while Bush got 74.8% of the vote.

BUTLER COUNTY

Butler County provided Bush with his largest margin of victory of any county in Ohio (a plurality of 53,629 votes). In Butler County there were 29,802 more votes counted for president in 2004 than in 2000. In order for Bush to have made the gains awarded to him in the official results, he must have gotten the votes of at least 22,651 (76.00%) of 29,802 new voters, or the equivalent, assuming with good reason that the Green voters did not support Bush.

In Butler County, Bush ran only 93 votes (0.085%) ahead of the "Yes" votes on Issue One, while Kerry ran 4,781 votes (9.3%) ahead of the "No" Votes on Issue One. But even this is inconsistent with the statewide trend, in which Kerry ran 32.71% ahead of the "No" votes, and Bush ran 14.10% behind the "Yes" votes. Some jurisdictions in Butler County show a vote distribution similar to the state wide pattern, for example: Hamilton City, where Kerry ran 30.46% ahead of the "No" votes, and Bush ran 7.88% behind the "Yes" votes; and Middletown City, where Kerry ran 46.51% ahead of the "No" votes, and Bush ran 17.87% behind the "Yes" votes. However, there are three sizeable cities and townships where the reverse is true: Liberty Township, and West Chester Township, and Oxford City.

I have prepared tables showing every precinct in the three suspect cities and townships of Warren County, by rearranging the data file posted on the Board of Elections website at http://www.butlercountyelections.org

West Chester Township first came to my attention when I compared the vote totals for the Presidential race with those of the Chief Justice race. A serious question had been raised as to how C. Ellen Connally, a little-known, underfunded, African-American municipal judge from Cleveland, running for Chief Justice of the Ohio Supreme Court against Thomas J. Moyer, a well-financed incumbent, in a race that drew 1.2 million fewer votes, statewide, than did the presidential race, could have received more votes than John Kerry in 13 of 88 counties. By far the largest of these counties were Butler, Clermont, and Warren, all in southwestern Ohio.

To investigate this question, I calculated, for each precinct, the number of ballots cast that were not for Connally (that is, votes for Moyer plus votes for no one), and compared these numbers with the votes awarded to Bush. The results reveal, on a precinct by precinct basis, how many, if any, of C. Ellen Connally's supporters must have voted for George W. Bush, in order for the official results to be true and correct.

I found that the number of votes not cast for Connally were nowhere near sufficient to account for the number of votes awarded to Bush. What the official results are saying is that, in these three counties, there were 13,577 people who voted for C. Ellen Connally for Chief Justice, and for George W. Bush for President: 7,440 people in Butler County, 3,580 people in Clermont County, and 2,557 people in Warren County. By far the highest number was in West Chester Township, where 1,755 voters, must have voted for both Connally and Bush. And these numbers are an absolute minimum. They are derived from an extremely conservative assumption, that all of the people who voted for neither candidate for Chief Justice voted for Bush for President. For every one of these who voted for Kerry, there would have to be yet another person who voted for both Connally and Bush. This story was reported in detail in my paper entitled "One More Look at Southwestern Ohio," submitted to the Ohio Supreme Court.

Also in West Chester Township, as it turns out, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in 41 of 45 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in 38 of 45 precincts. Gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush range as high as 68 of 696 (9.8%) in Precinct 5LR. In the entire township, out of 29,926 ballots cast, at least 1,213 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 67.4% of the vote, while Bush got 71.7% of the vote.

Liberty Township accounted for 24.5% of the reported increase in Bush's margin of victory in Butler County (Bush won a plurality of 8,433 votes in Liberty Township in 2004, compared to 5,147 votes in 2000). Compared to 2000 there was reportedly a 41.02% increase in voter registration and a 46.43% increase in voter turnout, even though the population increased by only 3.12% county wide; and the increase in voter registration, as a percentage, is wildly distributed throughout the township. In three precincts alone, one of them brand new, the other two with reported increases in voter registration of 177.9% and 143.5%, Bush's margin of victory increased by 1583 votes compared to 2000. In six other precincts, each with a reported increase in voter registration of more than 30%, Bush enjoyed a net gain of 924 votes. These phenomena were reported in my previous paper entitled "Election Results in Southwestern Ohio," submitted to the Ohio Supreme Court. Also in Liberty Township, there were at least 1,374 persons who voted for both C. Ellen Connally and George W. Bush.

In Liberty Township, Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in all 20 precincts, and Kerry ran behind the "No" votes in all 20 precincts. Gay marriage supporters who voted for Bush accounted for 82 of 923 ballots cast (8.9%) in Precinct 4DF, and 121 of 1580 (7.7%) in Precinct 4DI. In the entire township, out of 15,641 ballots cast, at least 713 gay marriage supporters voted for Bush. Issue One got 71.9% of the vote, while Bush got 77.3% of the vote. The numbers from West Chester Township and Liberty Township illustrate perfectly why election investigators must examine the results at the town and precinct levels. At the county level, these numbers are offset by the normal vote distributions in Hamilton City and Middletown City.

Oxford City is home to Miami University. While Bush ran ahead of the "Yes" votes in all 15 precincts, Kerry still won the city, handily. Issue One was <u>defeated</u> with 63.7% of the vote, while Kerry won 56.3% of the vote. In 2000, Al Gore received only 41.2% of the vote in Oxford City. It stands to reason that a proposal to outlaw gay marriage would encounter strong opposition on the campus of a state college, where many young Republicans might be more tolerant on the matter. There is no evidence that the election results were altered in Oxford City.

CONCLUSION

Actually, I do not really believe that thousands of voters in four Ohio counties, all of them Republican strongholds, went to the polls last November to cast their votes in favor of both gay marriage and George W. Bush. There may have been some voters who did this, but surely not 3500 voters in Delaware County, 2000 voters in Clermont County, 3000 in Warren County, and 2000 in Butler County. There is a small organization of loyal Republicans, known as the "Log Cabin Republicans," who happen to be gay, but they declined to endorse George W. Bush for president in 2004 because of his opposition to civil unions. And yet, statistically, there is no way to account for the official election results in these four counties without a minimum of 10,500 voters opposing Issue One while supporting George W. Bush, just as there is no way to account for the official election results in three of these same counties without a minimum of 13,500 voters supporting both Ellen Connally and George W. Bush, or without 65% to 80% of new voters choosing Bush over John F. Kerry. No matter how I look at these election results, the numbers do not add up. The official, certified results cannot be true and correct. It is my professional opinion, having exhaustively studied the election results in these counties, that the true vote counts were altered, and that tens of thousands of votes were shifted from Kerry to Bush.

I must emphasize again that 10,500 is the absolute minimum number of voters who must have opposed Issue One and supported George W. Bush in these four counties. Either that, or the official results are not true and correct. Statewide, Bush ran 14.10% behind the "Yes" vote on Issue One, and Kerry ran 32.71% ahead of the "No" vote on Issue One. Had the same pattern prevailed in Butler, Clermont, Delaware and Warren counties, Bush would have carried them by a combined plurality of only 59,928 votes, rather than the margin of 158,779 votes reported in the official results. This implies that as many as 50,000 votes may have been shifted from Kerry to Bush, thus affecting the margin by 100,000 votes.

It is true that there must have been some Republicans, not of the Log Cabin persuasion, who voted against Issue One and for George W. Bush. Issue One restricted anything that approximated gay marriage, and so was opposed by many businesses on the ground that it would interfere with their ability to recruit and maintain a high-quality workforce. But why should such voters have been concentrated in these four counties, where the election results have been challenged on other grounds as well?

All four of these counties have a "paper trail" - punch card ballots in Butler, Delaware and Warren counties, optically scanned ballots in Clermont County. We need to examine the best forensic evidence. We need to look at the paper.
